I am Assistant Professor of Knowledge, Governance and Transformation in the group 'Knowledge to Transformations in Society' (KiTeS) and have been working at UT since 2009. My main foci:

1. Enabling consistent research and education:

All of this must be made structurally possible.

- Balancing of interests: Our diverse faculty harbours enormous potential of various kinds. My aim is to support the faculty in keeping this diversity in a good balance of interests.
